MEANDERING AROUND THE NAMEKAGON RIVER A SELF GUIDED TOUR

Coming west on Hwy M, turn south on to Hwy 63 and drive about 1 ½ miles and turn right on Namakagon River Road. The Town of Cable has actually misspelled the road name. The river is spelled Namakagon and the Lake and Town are spelled Namakagon. How this happened is another story.

This section of road is built over the first primitive tote road in the county named the New Richmond to Ashland Road. Prior to the road, it would have been a Native American walking trail. Eldon Marple mentions this road in his vignette, "Tote Trails to the Timber." This road was built in the mid 1870s and lost it's importance when the railroad arrived in Cable in 1880.

About a city block down this road you will come to a 90 degree corner. Look to the right. What looks like an old tote road is an old railroad grade. This logging railroad and it's tracks were owned by the Rust-Owen Company of Drummond and were used to haul logs on contract from the Big Brook Lake area to a mill on the east side of the river. Continuing on, you will next cross over Big Brook Creek.

Next you will notice a pull-off on the right. It is here that Big Brook enters the river. At this point tracks were laid down on the riverbed across the river and continued on the east side of the river to a sawmill near Leonard School road.

Continue on. If you want a walking tour, park on the side of the Namekagon River Road just short of the stop sign on Leonard School Road. Start walking!

Almost directly across Leonard School Road you would have seen a small store owned by Chester Laudenschlager with a sign above the door, Squaw Bend Store.

When Hwy 63 was built on the east side of the river at Leonard School Road, a much larger building was built for Chester's store and included a bar, dancehall, and gas pumps. This store he named the Wigwam.

Walk along Leonard School Road to the west on the south side of the road. About 100 paces along, you will see an opening into the woods. Enter the woods and you will be standing on the spot of Leonard School house. This was one of the rural grade schools of the Cable School District.

Walk further in on this trail and you will see that it is on an old tote road. This road was called Log Drop Road. Logs would have been stacked along the road and rolled into the river during the log drive.

When you have walked about a block, you will notice that the trail starts to descend. Stop here. If you look down on the river you will see that it is flowing away from you. In a few hundred yards, it will make a 90 degree turn to the south. This turn in the river is called Squaw Bend.

This bend in the river was so abrupt that it created a whirlpool. A severe storm in July 2016 created a flow of water so forceful that it scoured out this bend in the river and the whirlpool is gone.

The basis for the Legend of Squaw Bend is that a young Native American woman camped in the woods at this location with her young son, waiting for her husband to return from war. She somehow got caught up in the whirlpool and drowned. A sad story.

Well that's it for now. Hope you enjoyed your tour!


